## Dear Representative:

On behalf of the more than one million members of the NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF REALTORS®, I am writing to encourage you to vote in favor of H.R. 3086, The Permanent Internet Tax Freedom Act, when it comes to the House floor for a vote tomorrow. This important bill is designed to keep the Internet permanently free of state and local access taxes or any kind of multiple or discriminatory tax on electronic commerce.

The Internet has become an integral and vital part of the lives of almost all Americans, and it has greatly enhanced the ways that we as a nation learn, relax, and work. In the commercial world, the Internet is now so paramount that it is almost difficult to remember how business was conducted before its advent.

Nowhere is this more true than in real estate. The REALTOR® business model makes extensive use of the Internet. Prospective homebuyers search online for homes, offers are made and accepted, and transactions are even closed over the Internet.
